ChiroFirst is a 12-month demonstration project that incorporates the concept of value-based care and utilizes ChiroCare Centers of Excellence clinics to collect data in support of the Triple Aim (cost, quality outcomes, and patient satisfaction). Dr. Vivi-Ann Fischer will also discuss lessons learned along the way of implementing a program with small, independent clinics who have limited IT resources.

Description: Inducements. Dual Fee Schedules. Illegal Time-Of-Service Discounts. Membership Plans. Risk management is no longer limited to malpractice claims. There is now a greater risk of financial loss due to improper discounting and faulty financial and collection policies than ever before. The Office of Inspector General (OIG) and Medicare are cracking down of healthcare fraud and abuse, and most doctors of chiropractic are not aware of how successful these efforts have been. This presentation will identify the five most common practices utilized.

Why Do They Call Us Expert?

Presenter: Warren Jahn, DC

Description: An expert is a person with specialized knowledge, skill, experience, training, or education that qualifies that person to form helpful opinion(s) which will be relevant to the issues in the case, is reliable and will be helpful to the trier of fact. A relatively small but essential part of the forensic expert's responsibilities involves testifying about the scientific basis of analyses, findings, and conclusions in anticipation for litigation during a deposition or in court. An effective expert must understand the dynamics of trial, possess excellent communication skills and have a full command of the litigation process. To evolve from neophyte to effective seasoned expert, one must shed common misconceptions about the expert's role and learn to avoid common mistakes. These critical elements will be explored during this session.

Tales From The Other Side: Errors that Commonly Derail Payor Post-Payment Efforts Presenter: Mike Miscoe, JD

Description: Mr. Miscoe, who has nearly two decades of experience as a forensic coding expert, has been engaged most commonly by counsel representing health care providers in post payment disputes. He additionally has 8 years of experience as a lawyer representing providers in post payment matters. Applying this background, he will address some of the more common problems found with payer investigations and audit results. He will demonstrate how these problems impact the payer's ability to successfully support overpayment allegations as well as allegations of fraudulent conduct. Case examples will be provided as object lessons with focus on the impact that investigative and audit related mistakes had on the ultimate outcome. Tips on how these errors might have been avoided or mitigated at the early stages of the investigation will be provided. The appropriate use of experts will also be addressed to include the most common mistakes experts make that can derail a potentially winnable case.

Description: Definitional attributes of healthcare quality include technical performance, patient-centeredness, access, efficiency, and cost-effectiveness among others. The Institute of Medicine (IOM) and Agency for Healthcare Research (AHRQ) have made us aware of gaps in care and identified opportunities to improve quality of care and safety in the U.S. Our discussion will assess and explore engagement of the chiropractic profession in these efforts and offer insights into opportunities and consequences.

Interprofessional Collaboration In Spine Care And Musculoskeletal Pain Management Presenter: James E. Eubanks, Jr. DC, MS

Description: This course will provide applicable education in:

Description: This 2 hour program will expand the physician's knowledge of LASER Therapy. Laser Therapy is utilized as a therapeutic instrument that can be highly effective if administered properly with correct parameters for the condition being treated. Many clinicians do not achieve the results expected because the wavelength or dosage provided is not adequate for the lesion or condition. This lecture will assist the clinician and the examiner/reviewer to understand the science behind this modality. The current guidelines and scientific evidence will be discussed to determine reasonable utilization parameters. The class will provide the attendee information to be more adept in presenting an opinion concerning the clinical appropriateness of LASER as documented in the medical record.

Effects Of Globalized Media Tone On Bias Toward Chiropractic In Google SERP Presenter: Stephen Perle, DC, MS

Description: Because of perceptual vigilance chiropractors often believe that the media are biased when reporting on stroke and chiropractic. This presentation will review the science behind the association between chiropractic cervical spinal manipulation. The purpose of this study was to use a research method to study the media coverage of stroke and chiropractic using Google news search to find prevalence of media and determining the effect of bias on Search Engine Ranking Page (SERP). The results will then be compared to Google new search for 2015 vs 2016, when a high profile celebrity died purportedly after SMT. Discussion about appropriate social media responses to this issue will be presented.

Ethics and Evidence: Biomedical Ethics At The Intersection With Evidence Based Medicine Presenter: Charles Simpson, DC, DABCO

Description: Through didactic instructions, group discussion and experimental learning, attendees will assess their own ethical perspectives and decision making, review the development of biomedical ethics with a particular focus on the history of chiropractic ethical thought and develop an understanding of current biomedical ethics and how these intersect with research, evidence based practice and the contemporary emergence of high value health care.
